President's Column

It has been a difficult year and a half for everyone. In an effort to keep you well the Board of Genesee Valley Audubon Society has decided to keep in place precautionary measures until January 2022. We will continue to hold our monthly meetings by Zoom. We will continue to ask you to register for hikes. That way we know who is coming. On field trips we will not ask participants to wear masks but we ask that you bring a mask with you in case someone is uncomfortable. Unvaccinated individuals must wear masks on field trips. In enclosed spaces we will mask based on CDC guidelines.

As I said at the beginning, it has been a difficult year and a half for all of us. I would like to take this opportunity to point out what GVAS what has accomplished since July 1, 2020, the beginning of our fiscal year. GVAS's first events last year were two water chestnut pulls in Salmon Creek where it runs into Braddock Bay. On our first pull we partnered with the Finger Lakes Partnership for Regional Invasive Species Management (FL-Prism) and the New York Parks Boat Stewards to pull 735 pounds. On our second pull eight of our members and four members of the FL-PRISM pulled 740 lbs. This brought the total for that area to 1470 lbs, cleaning most of that area. The European water chestnut is an invasive species that would cover the top of Braddock Bay Wildlife Management Area in a few years. This area is also a National Audubon Society Important Bird Area because a large number of birds use the area, such as ducks and hawks. That is why we do so much work there.

GVAS's next activity to get you outside was the Coastal Cleanup on the east side of Braddock Bay.



Twelve members showed up in mid-September to pick up 105 pounds of trash to keep it from becoming micro-plastics in Lake Ontario. I hope you will join us this September to make a difference to this ecosystem.

It took us a while but we figured out how to offer you seven monthly programs by Zoom to keep you informed. The Board Members offered you 13 wonderful field trips to go on. If you read the May/June Meadowlark you learned how to keep birds from hitting your window. If you missed it you can access it at our website, www.gvaudubon.org.

Beach Cleanup at Braddock Bay, Volunteers Needed

Join GVAS at Braddock Bay for the annual International Coastal Cleanup on September 25 at 9:00 am at Westpoint Marina, 105 E. Manitou Rd. in Greece. We will meet in the public parking loop before the Marina.

GVAS has picked up over a ton of trash at Braddock Bay over the years and we need your help again this year to keep the bay clean.

Trash entangles wildlife and plastic bags cover the bottom of the bay, preventing plants from growing. We have now learned that plastic trash that enters the lake can be ground down into small plastic pieces called microplastics. Microplastics get into the food chain from the bottom, then into the fish, and then into people who eat them. Help us stop this process.

BIRD OF PREY

"Bird of Prey" is the stunning story of the critically endangered great Philippine eagle with the remarkable story of wildlife cinematographer Neil Rettig and a small group of conservationists from the Philippine Eagle Foundation, who work tirelessly to save the bird from extinction. The film follows Rettig's return to the Philippines 36 years after he and his crew captured the first-ever



recorded images of the eagle in the wild. Decades later, Rettig returns to the Philippine jungle on a grueling expedition to find the reclusive raptor and once again films a pair of eagles as they attempt to raise a newborn chick.

With fewer than 400 breeding pairs left in the wild, the Philippine eagle is considered the world's

rarest bird of prey and the future survival of the species is in doubt.

Puffins, Little Fish and Climate Change (with Dr. Steve Kress - from the Lincoln Theater presentation in Damariscotta Maine, August 2018)

Dr Steve Kress talks about the Puffin Project, which is almost 50 years old. He talks about the start of this visionary project and its far-reaching impacts. The Puffin Project restored Atlantic Puffins to the coast of Maine; it restored other symbiotic seabirds as well. Once word got out about the success of the project, the model was used around the world to restore other seabirds. Many other lessons have been learned along the way including how climate change is affecting the lives of Puffins and other northern seabirds.



While this is a recording, this is an excellent source of information, and we hope you will join GVAS to learn about the Audubon Puffin Project.

Field Trips

Genesee River Trailway, Petten St to Turning Point Park, Monday, September 13, 2021, 10:00am – 12:00pm. We will meet at the marina on Petten St off Lake Avenue south of the O’Rorke Bridge (Pattonwood). We will walk to the end of the boardwalk at the bottom of Turning Point Park and back and enjoy the sights and sounds of the Genesee River in late summer. We hope we’ll get one last look at our favorite migrant birds before they head to their winter feeding territories.
